Actions of the College of Arts and Sciences Curriculum & Instruction Committee

Meeting of November 8, 2013

The College of Arts and Sciences Curriculum & Instruction Committee met on Friday, November 8, 2013. The committee considered and approved proposals from the Departments of Biological and Environmental Sciences; Chemistry, Physics, and Astronomy; English and Rhetoric; Government and Sociology; and History and Geography; and the PaLS program. Prior to the committee meeting, the proposals were posted for review and approval by the CoAS faculty and dean.

- The Department of Biological and Environmental Sciences proposed making BIOL4890 and GEOL4130 equivalent to ENSC; and six new courses: GEOL/ENSC3200, BIOL4155, GEOL/ENSC4460, BIOL/ENSC4785, BIOL/ENSC4795, and GEOL4951 (pages 2-33).
- The Department of Chemistry, Physics, and Astronomy proposed changes to the BS in Physics (pages 34-41).
- The Department of English and Rhetoric proposed four new courses: ENGL4023, ENGL4024, ENGL4025, and ENGL4468; and changes to the BA major in English with Concentration in Creative Writing (pages 42-75).
- The Department of Government and Sociology proposed a new course, SOCI2100, an addition to Area F for the BA in Sociology (pages 76-81).
- The Department of History and Geography proposed the addition of BIOL2800 and MFLG courses to Area F for the BA in Geography; and a new course. GEOG4310 (pages 82-90)
- The PaLS program proposed a Pre-law Concentration in the existing BA in Philosophy; and four new courses: PHIL3000, PHIL4675, PHIL4680, and IDST3000 (pages 91-108).

I submit these proposals now for your consideration and approval. The original proposals and the master course file change form are attached.

Re:

B.A. in Philosophy with Pre-Law Concentration

The Philosophy program currently offers several courses that are typically recommended for students interested in Law School: Survey of Philosophy; Logic and Critical Thinking; Ethical Theory; Social and Political Philosophy; Environmental Ethics; Philosophy of Law.

Studies also show that Philosophy majors rank first among all majors in law school acceptance rate: 82.4%. Philosophy majors rank first among all majors in LSAT score (see for example http://webs.purduecal.edu/philosophy/graduate-school-preparation/). One of our recent graduates is currently pursuing a law degree at the University of Chicago.

Giving our students the opportunity to pursue a Philosophy major with a pre-Law concentration would be attractive to potential philosophy majors and prepare our majors more adequately to pursue a post-graduate degree in Law. We therefore propose to offer a Pre-Law concentration within the Philosophy major.

Students will continue to take Survey of Philosophy and Logic and Critical Thinking in Area F. To complete the Pre-Law concentration, of the 8 upper division courses that students are currently required to take for the major, students will be required to take the following Philosophy courses:

PHIL 4675 Philosophy of Law

PHIL 4340 Social and Political Philosophy

PHIL 4410 Ethical Theory

PHIL 4680 Environmental Ethics
