Course Description:

Presentations, Active Class Participation, Written Compilation/Research, Class Discussions, Reflective papers, discussion board postings, videos, and other class activities.

Attendance Policy:

Students are expected to attend all scheduled classes and field trip excursions. Any student who misses class or a class trip without an accepted reason stated in advance will receive a grade penalty (example: the student's grade will be lowered by a full letter— an "A" will become a "B"). Absences will be excused only by an official provider's certificate or as may be accepted by the course faculty. Students who are habitually tardy and who do not attend class or field excursions may be asked to withdraw from the course.

Punctuality:

You are expected to be on time for all classes and field trip excursions.

E-mail/D2L/GaView:

Updates, news, and essential information will be disseminated through these mediums. It is the responsibility of the student to regularly check for messages in order to avoid missing pertinent information.

Multiculturalism/Diversity:

Where appropriate, the course will address racial, cultural, and gender differences with regard to conducting research in related fields of study. The course will discuss the importance of cultural sensitivity, and the care which must be taken with regard to the subject vulnerability of special populations as it applies to obtaining informed consent.
